World Vision China

In 1982, World Vision responded to the Qinghai flood disaster and expanded our work in China with the support of the central government and other levels of government. The China office was established in 1993 to further our mission in community development and other humanitarian efforts.

Under the *Law of the People's Republic of China on the Administration of Activities of Overseas Non-Governmental Organizations in the Mainland of China*, World Vision China registered representative offices in eight provincial administrative regions. We work with governments, social organizations, and communities to serve children in need and improve the well-being of children in China.

In 2022, World Vision offices supported our project funding of **CNY 61,032,488 (USD 9,412,819)**. Over 70% was donated by Hong Kong and Macau donors on a regular monthly basis. World Vision is accountable to our donors through annual internal and external audits and working with diligently selected partners. We are committed to bringing sustainable change to the vulnerable children we serve.

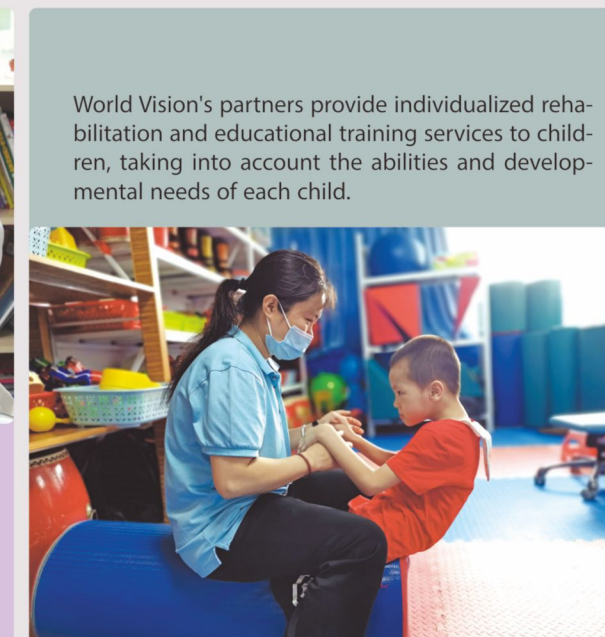
World Vision collaborated with local NGOs in the Go Baby Go project that helps to build the self-confidence and ability of caregivers of children aged 0~3, enhance the relationship between children and caregivers, and promote early childhood growth and development.



World Vision facilitated the development of school disaster preparedness plans and conducted disaster risk reduction activities to create community awareness. Children built simple stretchers with clothes and wooden rods to use during an emergency.

Child Protection and Development

World Vision is committed to creating a safe and caring environment for children's development, working with child protection practitioners and duty bearers to improve the self-awareness and positive communication skills of children, adolescents, and caregivers and protect children from violence in their communities. World Vision launched projects such as the 'Establishing Child Protection System in China', 'Guarding the Future' and 'Building CSO Capacity in Adopting Child Safe Organization Framework (CSOF)' to enable child directors, child welfare supervisors, frontline social workers, and local NGOs to respond, identify, report, refer and treat child protection cases. They can also provide prompt support and quality services to children and caregivers.

To focus on protecting young children, World Vision continued the Go Baby Go project to help caregivers build and strengthen their awareness and children protection practices to eradicate domestic violence from young children's development as early as possible. Children are also active contributors. Life skills activities raised their awareness and helped build their capacity to participate in child development issues that affect them. In 2022, World Vision invited child representatives to advise and share their views with its management about the effectiveness and participation of child development programs. World Vision values feedback from all parties - especially children - which is critical for implementing effective children's development programs.

In 2022, World Vision China's child protection and development program served more than **199,232** children.



Main activities:

- Supported **39,952** children to learn life skills and improve their awareness and ability to protect themselves.
- Empowered **6,119** children to build their confidence and skills and to serve their peers and communities through children's groups.
- Enhance the capabilities of **13,889** child social workers to understand their role in protecting and providing reliable assistance to children threatened by violence.

Story of change As strong as I am

Hongyan is nine years old and attends grade four in primary school. She is very thoughtful compared with her peers. Her parents work in the city throughout the year, leaving Hongyan and her sister to live with their grandmother in a resettlement community. Being apart from her parents for a long time since she was young may have caused Hongyan to lose confidence sometimes. Although she looks strong, her eyes often reveal a sense of loneliness and helplessness.

After attending a life skills training organized in her community by World Vision, Hongyan became more cheerful, lively, and active. She sometimes shares her feelings with the trainer. She said that her parents had been away working for a long time, and they only got to see each other during the summer and winter holidays when she visited their workplace. In recent years, traveling and staying together have become challenging because of the pandemic. She could only speak to them via a phone or video call when she misses them. She also said she liked the activities organized by World Vision. Being around people and having lots of fun makes her forget her loneliness. She is learning to become stronger, get along with others and control her emotions. She does not cry that easily anymore. Hongyan said, "When I am courageous and thoughtful, my parents will not worry about us and can continue to work."

During a sharing activity, Hongyan could tell others what kind of person she is. She said with a smile, "Although I am a bit chubby and short, but I have a strong heart and a lively personality. I am confident; I like to paint and always laugh." She also shared she wants to study hard and attend a good university. She wishes she could grow up quickly and share her parents' burdens. We hope Hongyan will realize her dreams and grow up happily!

2022 Our Achievements Migrant Children



One of World Vision China's national strategies is to improve the well-being of migrant children by building capacities of local NGOs that, in turn, can provide better quality services to migrant children and their caregivers. These services include promoting the development, protection, and integration of migrant children and their families; helping migrant children build positive relationships with their peers; equipping caregivers with positive parenting and childcare skills; encouraging communities to support migrant children and families in adapting to a new environment and promoting better integration.

Main activities:

- **7,123** migrant children participated in activities promoting quality development and self-protection.
- **622** caregivers participated in activities that promote positive parenting and child protection.
- Equipped **2,288** community members with skills to respond to the needs of migrant children to develop, be protected, and participate.



Story of change Build a home together



Yuanyuan is now confident to share her opinions in group discussions.

Yuanyuan attends junior high school. She migrated to Xi'an City from her hometown when she was young but is still adjusting to the new environment. She lives with her father and grandmother, who mainly care for her daily needs.

A social worker invited Yuanyuan to join the "Build a home together" children's group supported by World Vision shortly after their first meeting. During a sharing session, The social worker noticed Yuanyuan looking sad when children were describing their breakfast time with their families. After the program ended, Yuanyuan told the social worker that she longed for her mother's love. Using what she learned from the activities, the social worker began to guide Yuanyuan to assess her relationship with her mother and family. The social worker also invited Yuanyuan's father to join parent-child activities and spoke to him about Yuanyuan's situation and her longing for maternal care.

Yuanyuan's emotional health began to improve under the care of the project team and her family. She used to have trouble concentrating during her studies but has slowly started to take care of and speak up for herself. When the children's group was working to develop a children's nutrition manual, Yuanyuan actively expressed her opinion and helped other younger children to look up the dictionary. She also willingly became an ambassador to promote nutrition and health knowledge in schools and to children in the community.

After an activity had ended, Yuanyuan would send a WeChat message to the social worker to express her gratitude. She felt fortunate she was invited to join the "Build a home together" children's group. This experience has made her feel warm and loved, her horizon has broadened, and she appreciates the support from everyone who helped her grow and develop.

Health, Water and Sanitation



Water, sanitation, and hygiene are critical environmental factors affecting children and youth's health. World Vision improves schools and communities' access to safe drinking water and handwashing facilities while cultivating good hygiene practices among children and youth to help them stay healthy.

With the economy's development and social environment changes, injury has become a severe public health problem. Children and youth are the main sufferers due to their physiological characteristics. In China, injury is the first cause of death for children and youth, threatening their mortality, health and quality of life. World Vision improves potentially hazardous areas in schools and communities and also enhance caretakers, children and youth's knowledge about injury and self-protection.



In 2022, World Vision China's health program served **29,271** people.



Main activities:

- Conducted educational activities on handwashing and how to manage common diseases for children to help improve the personal hygiene practices of **3,797** people.
- Constructed clean drinking water systems used by **1,697** people.
- Renovated sanitary toilets in rural areas used by **7,959** people.
- Conducted education activities on child injury prevention (especially about drowning, traffic injuries and falls) for **26,019** people.

Story of change No more bad smell from the toilet again!

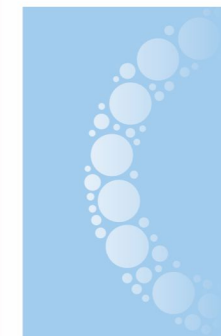
Green mountains and trees surround the primary school. During mid-summer afternoons, birds sing in the trees while teachers and students learn in the classrooms. As the breeze blows, they feel the coolness of the air, punctuated by swifts of pungent smell from the nearby toilet. Subconsciously, the children raise their hands to cover their noses.

In 2000, the school constructed this dry toilet, which is now old and worn out. They did not include a septic tank when it was first built. It has become dirty and infested with mosquitoes, causing a health hazard to the school and its students.

To resolve this problem and improve the hygiene of the school, World Vision partnered with the school to build ten sanitary squat toilets complemented by a standard 3-chamber septic tank.

The students were delighted to have new toilets. Nine years old Xiaolian said: "They have finally completed the toilets in our school. The new toilets are very clean, and they are not smelly at all!" World Vision also worked with the school to organize some educational activities for the students to teach them about handwashing, diarrhea, pneumonia, and other health-related information. Xiaolian shared: "In these activities, we learned that washing our hands can prevent diarrhea. We know how to use the seven steps of handwashing, and we must wash our hands before meals and after using the toilet. We are grateful to World Vision for building these new toilets and sharing useful information with us."

Mr. Wu, the headmaster, also shared: "The new toilets have improved the hygiene and environment of our school. Through the health education activities, our students learned the proper handwashing method and good healthy habits. The education activities conducted by World Vision were not only interesting but useful and timely."

2022 Our Achievements Disability Inclusion



World Vision China runs disability inclusion projects in Tianjin, Shaanxi, and Guangxi. These projects support local partners to provide quality care, rehabilitation, education, and social work services to rural and urban children with disabilities to achieve holistic development. Local partners also offer psychosocial support to caregivers, train service providers, and help communities to build an accessible and inclusive environment. This enables children with disabilities to participate in decision-making on matters affecting their lives and improve their social participation.

In 2022, we successfully promoted a community-based rehabilitation model at the city, county, and village levels. We increased online services and remote guidance for children in remote areas in response to the pandemic. We also explored and paved the way for vocational training for youth with disabilities as part of our effort to promote the development and social inclusion of children with disabilities.



Main activities:

- Provided quality rehabilitation, education, and social work services to **1,375** children benefited.
- Provided knowledge and skills on how to take care of children with disabilities to parents and caregivers who care for **285** children.
- Supported **517** children with disabilities to participate in community activities.

Story of change You can do it, Xiaomei!

Nine years old Xiaomei has Down Syndrome. She is withdrawn, has slow speech development, and has a peculiar temper but is particular about cleanliness and tidiness.

When Xiaomei meets a stranger, she usually lowers her head and would not make eye contact or speak. Her mother ensures Xiaomei eats well, dresses warmly, and goes to school and back home every day. But her teacher says Xiaomei does not listen to instructions. She attends classes when she feels like it, will play alone if she does not want to learn, and needs her teacher and friends to take her to the canteen during lunchtime. World Vision spent more than two years helping Xiaomei's mother understand how to care for her daughter's rehabilitation and build her independence. She began to also plan for Xiaomei's future development and would join more parent-child activities together. As a result, Xiaomei's teacher noticed that Xiaomei's class attendance has increased; she can eat independently and now plays with her classmates.

In 2022, Xiaomei joined World Vision's 'Walk with You' project. Her mother received professional rehabilitation training and guidance from doctors. Through home visits by social workers, she learned to take note of her child's mood changes and tried her best to make changes by spending more time with her daughter. She is comforted when Xiaomei shows improvement: "Xiaomei can say a few more words now, and her pronunciation is improving. She can articulate words like auntie, uncle, drink, eat."

Xiaomei's mother took her to join a parent-child summer camp organized by World Vision this year. Xiaomei enjoyed her time and was very happy after she returned home. Her mother gets emotional when she speaks about Xiaomei's progress; she has more confidence in caring for her daughter. Xiaomei is not alone anymore. She has her mother, sister, and many uncles and aunts cheering her on. You can do it, Xiaomei!

2022 Our Achievements Relief and Rehabilitation



Emergency Response and Relief

In June 2022, World Vision's disaster assessment team visited Wuyuan and Ganxian in Jiangxi Province to understand the needs of people who were hit by floods. In early July, with the help of local partners, World Vision donated **CNY 200,000** worth of supplies, including **1,800** bags of rice and **1,800** barrels of cooking oil, to 1,800 families in Wuyuan and Ganxian, helping a total of **9,365** people.

Disaster Risk Reduction and Preparedness

Under the 20th National Congress of the Communist Party of China, one of the priorities to enhance public safety governance is to reduce disaster risk. Prioritizing prevention would decrease losses caused by disasters. World Vision focuses on helping communities improve their disaster risk reduction capacity.

In 2022, World Vision China continued collaborating with local NGOs, academics, and professionals to support communities in enhancing their disaster risk reduction knowledge, risk assessment, and self-protection. We conducted this training for **149,180** people in Shaanxi, Guizhou, and Hebei provinces.

COVID-19 Response

In 2022, our COVID-19 Response reached **8,408** people across all our operation areas. **5,526** children have improved access to water, sanitation, and hygiene facilities in their schools, including toilets, shower rooms, handwashing stations, and drinking water systems.

1,256 child social workers received the *Child Protection in Emergency Manual*, which explained children's vulnerabilities exacerbated by ongoing COVID-19 outbreaks and imposed restrictions. This manual will help social workers identify and respond to the unique needs of children that arose during the pandemic.

Story of change Offering help at the time of disaster

Since the flooding season started this year, heavy rainfall has poured continuously in 7 provinces in South China. Among them, Jiangxi, Guangdong, Guangxi, and Hunan suffered the most, with more than 6 million people affected by floods or landslides. World Vision's disaster assessment team rushed to areas that were severely affected. When they saw a vast need for daily necessities, World Vision sent relief items to support those affected by the disaster.

Chunhua's family consists of five people. When the flood hit her community, she did not manage to save any household essentials because she had to take care of her son, who was less than three years old. The flood water destroyed all the electrical appliances and furniture in her house and the harvest from their farmland. Chunhua received a bag of rice and a barrel of cooking oil at the distribution site. She expressed her gratitude to the local government and World Vision.

“More than just a MOM”

It Takes a World to End Domestic Violence Against Children

In response to the announcement of the *Family Education Promotion Law* and to provide better support to parents, World Vision followed up last year's "Battle of the Dads" campaign by collaborating with IKEA Guangzhou Tianhe Store, Melissa & Doug and artist Mr. Lam Yuk Fai this year to launch another online campaign called "More than just a MOM." This activity aimed to promote the health and well-being of mothers, such as the importance of self-confidence, self-esteem, and self-improvement. Their well-being would, in turn, influence the building of parent-child relationships and the healthy growth of children.

In Shaanxi and Jiangxi provinces, World Vision joined forces with Shaanxi Women and Children's Development Foundation and Nanchang Sunflower Social Work Service Center (南昌太阳花社会工作服务中心) to sensitize and improve the professionalism of local child social workers. They received support in identifying, reporting, and managing child protection cases. This supports the implementation of the Mandatory Reporting System, which comes under the revised *Law on the Protection of Minors*. It would help reduce children's risks of facing domestic violence and provide a safer environment for them to grow and strive.

In 2022, World Vision focused our efforts on working with local partners to create communities free of violence:

- **1,059** child social workers improved their capacities in preventing domestic violence and conducting positive family workshops.
- **11,096** parents and **3,756** children participated in positive family workshops and parent-child activities to strengthen family unit relationships and contribute towards children's better development.

Listening to Children

The right to participation is a core principle of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Children's opinions are critical in matters affecting them. World Vision regularly consults children for feedback on issues and projects we carry out in their community and provides a platform to communicate with adults, local partners, and decision-makers.

In June 2022, World Vision China's senior leadership team and board members held an inaugural meeting with child representatives from Yangxian, Shaanxi Province, and Suichuan, Jiangxi Province. The purpose of these meetings was to hear from children from the communities we serve and to make their feedback fundamental in our ministry decisions.

"I was astonished to see children from rural areas articulate their views about our programs and activities so well and share their aspirations freely. They performed much better than I did at that age." said John Teng, National Director of World Vision China.



40 YEARS FOR CHILDREN

It is more blessed to give than to receive!



Dr. Thomas Chan Sze Tong graduated from the Faculty of Medicine of the University of Hong Kong in 1977. He is one of the Founding Fellows of the College of Surgeons of Hong Kong. Having practiced medicine for 18 years and volunteered at a medical institution serving communities in need, Dr. Chan saw the difference between the needs of grassroots communities and working in a hospital. He began to consider helping people in need in a different position. After gaining his family's blessing, Dr. Chan joined World Vision to serve children and communities in 1996.

Dr. Chan admits that the work in the medical field and a social development organization was vastly different. However, there are some similarities in management. He knew there wasn't time to waste, he immediately immersed in the work and constantly reminded himself to stay humble.

As a National Director, he coordinated projects, sustained relationships with partners, engaged with external stakeholders, managed the organization and its operations, and many other roles. However, the part he cherished most and put much effort into was being a supporter. He spent 60% to 70% of his working hours listening to feedback from colleagues, partners, and government officials to provide appropriate support.

More staff personnel were needed when the projects increased. Many colleagues gave up better job opportunities or high salaries to work in the development sector. They held higher regard for being valued, heard, and recognized and wanted to see that their work was creating an impact. Building a team and retaining talent for social development organizations was a challenge.

Dr. Chan said, "It was very important to put the right person to manage a project. I would spend a lot of time and energy looking for suitable candidates. When we found the right people, I trusted them fully. I would support them to be agile when implementing projects because they were at the frontline, and they understood the local community's needs better than I did. My role was to give them the right support."

Reflecting on his 26 years of service in social development work under World Vision, Dr. Chan said time went by quickly. However, he does not regret it because he knew what he wanted to do. He cared less for how much he has contributed, was paid or given but treasured more what he learned, and gained during this time. To him, this experience is a blessing, and it is more blessed to give than to receive.

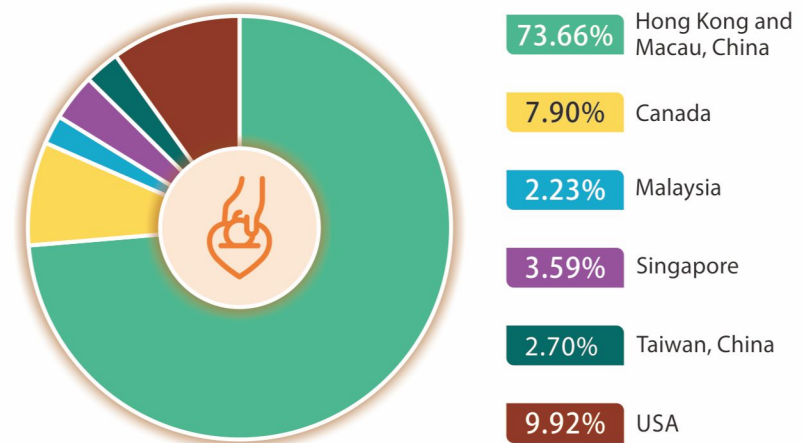

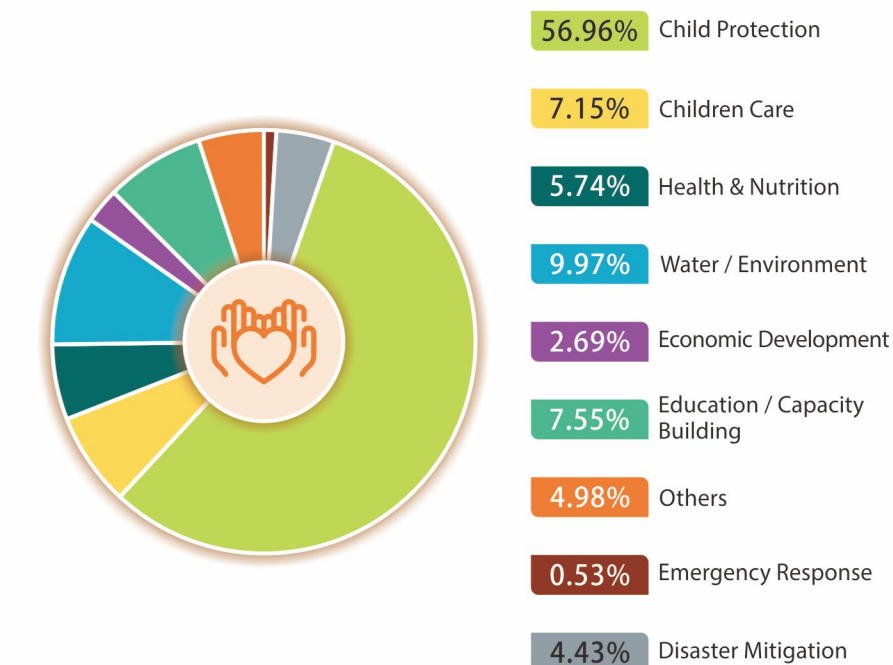
