





World Vision China

In 1993, World Vision China was established to carry out work in poverty alleviation and community development. All of our projects are initiated through close partnership with the local government, and receives their full support.

In 2020, World Vision China operated 26 child-focused Area Programs that directly benefited **46,980 sponsored children** and served **1,864,539 people** in China.

In accordance with the Law on Administration of Activities of Overseas Non-governmental Organizations in the Mainland China, World Vision China has Representative Offices in Guangdong, Yunnan, Guizhou, Jiangxi, Tianjin, Guangxi, Shaanxi and Hebei. In 2020, our total expenditure was RMB 107,273,591 (USD 15.21 million). We are supported by World Vision offices worldwide, with nearly 60% of funds raised via monthly donations from Hong Kong. World Vision China is accountable to our donors through annual internal and external audits, and diligent selection of partners we work with.



Fighting a Pandemic in 2020

At the beginning of 2020, an unexpected outbreak of the coronavirus spread across China. As of December 31, there has been 87,071 confirmed cases and 4,634 deaths in Mainland China. (Information taken from the National Health Commission of the People's Republic of China website.)

During the COVID-19 pandemic, World Vision stood in solidarity with the nation, and took the following steps to stop the spread of the virus:

Early February

Distributed nearly 50 thousand masks in five counties including Baihe, Duchang, and Shicheng. World Vision staff and local partners distributed and taught communities the correct way to wear masks.

Mid-March

World Vision donated 30 ventilators, 30 respiratory humidifiers, and 24 electrocardiogram monitors, worth approximately RMB 3.12 million in total, to three main hospitals in Wuhan.



Apart from distributing hygiene and disinfectant items to children and families, World Vision shared information on how to prevent the spread of the virus through WeChat online, booklets for parents and children, as well as animated educational videos. We also conducted online courses for teachers and child welfare workers, to enhance their child protection and disaster relief capacity.

World Vision continues to build water and sanitary facilities in Area Programs and schools, and improve hygiene behavior such as teaching children the seven steps of hand-washing, so that they are protected from infectious diseases such as the coronavirus and diarrhea. World Vision will also organize trainings and seminars about mental health and psychological support that can help communities respond to public health crisis.

World Vision uses the "INSPIRE: Seven Strategies for Ending Violence Against Children" developed by the World Health Organization and other organizations as our guiding framework, as well as a systematic approach to address the root causes of violence against girls and boys. We bring key actors together to create caring and supportive environments for all children, especially the most vulnerable children. In 2020, World Vision China's Child Protection projects have impacted the lives of 71,000 people.

World Vision works to improve the quality of early childhood education and learning environments, so that children and youth can access quality education and life skills development. In 2020, World Vision's Education and Life Skills projects have impacted the lives of 115,000 people.

Health and Nutrition Water and Sanitation



World Vision works with children, families and communities to improve nutrition for children, integrate water, sanitation and personal hygiene behavior, as well as prevent child injuries to ensure the health and well-being of children. In 2020, World Vision's Health and Nutrition, together with our Water and Sanitation projects have impacted the lives of 36,000 people.

Sustainable Livelihood and Resilience







World Vision carries out income generating projects, ecological agriculture trainings and disaster risk reduction exercises, to support parents or caregivers create sustainable living environments for children. In 2020, World Vision's Sustainable Livelihood and Resilience projects have impacted 58,000 people.

Relief and Rehabilitation

In June 2020, heavy rainfall flooded many provinces in southern China. Jiangxi was one of the worst hit provinces. As of July 2020, the floods affected 5.213 million people and caused economic losses of RMB 6.49 billion in Jiangxi. World Vision coordinated with the Jiangxi Department of Civil Affairs, Jiangxi Overseas Non-government Organizations Administration Office and Jiangxi Charity Federation to distribute 288 tons of rice, 8,200 quilts, 5,100 family kits, 100 child friendly kits and 100 hygiene kits to 56,800 people in Wuyuan County and Pengze County. The relief items were worth RMB 3.66 million.

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Xiaoshi, 8. cried when water started to enter her home. The heavy rainfall also caused a landslide that hit the back of their house, and cracked a wall in the kitchen. The COVID-19 pandemic plus the flood has been a double blow for this family that grows and collects tea leaves for a living. World Vision sent a second batch of relief assistance to Wuyuan County in September 2020. Xiaoshi's family received 15 kilograms of rice and a family kit which consisted of daily necessities such as a water bail, torchlight, cooking ban and tableware. Her grandmother said, "I am so happy because these items are very helpful." Xiaoshi smiled shyly and said "thank you".

World Vision conducts disaster risk reduction projects such as trainings and provide safety equipment. This equips schools and communities, especially children, with disaster mitigation and self-protection skills. It also builds resilience of the most vulnerable against risk and effects of disasters. In 2020, World Vision's disaster risk reduction projects have benefitted 30 local partner organizations and impacted the lives of 37,975 people.

Ending Domestic Violence Against Children The 5 Love Languages

As the "It Takes a World to End Domestic Violence Against Children" campaign entered its third year, the pandemic has pushed families to spend more time with each other, as well as caused more frictions within families. This year, World Vision joined forces with artists Alex Fong and Fung So Bor, early childhood education expert, Zeng Jia, and corporates such as Lee Kum Kee and Mustela to launch "The 5 Languages of Love" and "The Tongue: A Double-edged Sword" online campaigns. The theme was to encourage the use of love languages to improve the communication between parents and children.

World Vision also worked with schools, village committees and volunteers to implement positive parenting and parent and child activities for **6,239 community members** and **3,008 children**. These activities aim to encourage communication between parents and children, and to build a "zero tolerance for violence" environment. World Vision also worked with the Shaanxi Research Association for Women and Family to conduct an online course for 57 social workers from 31 civil social organizations to build their capacity on domestic violence.

Collaborating for Broader Impact

One of World Vision's global strategies under "Our Promise 2030" is to collaborate and advocate for broader impact.

World Vision works with different partners, including government, civil society organizations, corporates, academic institutions and others to

effectively mobilize our expertise, funding and resources to achieve sustainable development goals that focuses on child well-being, caring for and helping the most vulnerable. We also share our knowledge and skill sets with civil social organizations to strengthen the local capacity to serve children.


